Rosencrantz shares his grandparents and father's immigration story, which took them from Russian to Portland, Oregon. He also talks about moving to Las Vegas, Nevada, his childhood experiences within the Jewish community, and his family's furniture business in the city. Rosencrantz also discusses his involvement in the Jewish community over the decades, including the Young Leadership Program, United Jewish Appeal, Temple Beth Sholom, and the Jewish Federation.
